... finances?

Question:

Do I have to pay any college tuition as a student of the University of Osnabrück?

Answer:

Yes, both German and International students have to pay about 350€ each semester. This payment is the social fee (e.g. for the semester ticket for public transport in Osnabrück and its surroundings). For more information follow this link:

Is there any financial aid for International students available?

Answer:

There are several ways to get financial help in case of an emergency. The ASTA (https://www.asta.uni-osnabrueck.de/) and the International Center of the university offer you some help if necessary.

Question:

Where can I open a bank account?

Answer:

To pay the rent, your health insurance and so on, you need a bank account in Germany. Many banks offer free of charge bank accounts for students. More information on that topic will be provided during the Welcome Week.

Question:

Ist es teuer in Osnabrück zu studieren?

Answer:

In general the costs of living in Osnabrück are very low compared to other cities. Also, you can try to get scholarships. Here is an overview for you if you want to study in Osnabrück:

Expenses

Around € 700 per month is required for living in Osnabrück and for paying for the following necessities (all costs are estimates):

books, photocopying and study material:

between € 25 and € 50 per month

rent:

about € 150 to € 350 per month

health insurance:

approx. € 90 per month





meals:

Inexpensive lunch (ca. € 3 daily) is available at the student restaurant (Mensa) run by Student Services. In addition, between € 75 and € 130 is required every month to prepare further meals at home.

Student contributions (social fee):

Each semester, German and International students have to pay about approximately € 350 social fee (e.g. for the semester ticket for public transport in Osnabrück and its surroundings).

Question:

Can I work while studying in Osnabrück?

Answer:

International students who do not come from the EU, or who come from one of the new EU countries (membership since 2013) can usually work up to 120 full or 240 half days a year without a work permit. If you wish to work longer than that you need a work permit.

Question:

How can I find a job?

Answer:

Besides advertisements in the university (Schwarzes Brett: http://www-old.uni-osnabrueck.de/SchwarzesBrett/standard_en/schwarzesbrett.php) and the local press you can try the job agency of the Bundesagentur für Arbeit (https://www.jobcenter-osnabrueck.de/). The Bundesagentur für Arbeit cannot provide part-time jobs but you can find newspaper there in which you can look for current job offers.





Working as a student assistant

Positions to work as a student assistant at Osnabrück University are often available. You do not usually need a work permit for this kind of job, since it is usually assumed that the work is closely linked to your studies. Please note, however, that you do require an income tax card.

Application training

The Job information center (german: "Berufsinformationszentrum") (address: Johannistorwall 56, 49080 Osnabrück) offers a coaching for job applications for international students. You can make an appointment there one or two weeks in advance and then go there to ask for some advice for your application. It is even possible to take all the application documents directly with you to check whether forgot anything important.

... administrative duties & important documents?

Question:

Do I have to declare my new place of residence and if so, where can I do this?

Answer:

Arriving in Osnabrück it's the responsibility of German as well as International students to declare their new place of residence during the first week. You can do that at the register office. This civic duty applies to family members of the Internationals as well. Every person who moves to the city must register individually.

Question:

Do I need health insurance as a student in Germany?

Answer:

Yes, all students under 30 years studying in Germany require adequate health insurance.

In case you would like to see a doctor in Germany, please note that there is no doctor or medical center at the university. Please contact a doctor close to your home (general practitioner: "Hausarzt", "Internist"). You will find information about doctors (also specialists) in the "Gelbe Seiten". Please always bring your health insurance card with you when seeing a doctor.

Furthermore, we strongly recommend taking out private accident and liability insurance for your stay in Germany. More information is available from the International Office.

Where can I get an International Student Identity Card (ISIC)?

If you bring a passport photo, you can request the ISIC at the AStA of the University of Osnabrück (Alte Münze 12, 49074 Osnabrück) or at the travel agency STA Travel (Neumarkt 11, 49074 Osnabrück).

Where can I register for language courses at the University?

Answer:

To register for a German language course you have to do a placement test first. The result will determine which level (A1, A2, B1, B2, C1/C2) you are and thus which course you can enroll. Question:

Whom can I ask if I have general problems?

Answer:

There are specialized counseling services. Their employees will help you with coping with daily life. There you can find help concerning not only problems in daily life, e.g. dealing with letters from official agencies, but also questions about handling of studies and personal challenges.

Question:

Where can I get internet access?

Answer:

Every faculty of the University of Osnabrück offers internet access at a so called "CIP-Pool". This is a room equipped with computers for students of the respective faculty. If you didn't get your password yet, there are some cyber cafes you can use as well. At a small charge you can make use of the internet there.

Question:

Which mobile contract is the best?

Answer:

The easiest way is to ask your classmates which contracts they have. Most of the time having the same provider guarantees the cheapest way to call each other.

Question:

I have been admitted, where can I live?

Answer:

As in almost every German city it isn't easy to find an apartment in Osnabrück. Besides the students' halls of residence you can also rent a room in a shared apartment ("Wohngemeinschaft = WG").

You should ensure a written tenancy agreement is made once you have chosen a room or apartment. When you rent an apartment you are usually the main tenant (Hauptmieter). If you are only renting a room, then you are a subtenant (Untermieter), and as a subtenant you should know that you do not have the same rights as the main tenant. When you become a subtenant, be certain that you sign a subtenancy agreement (Untermietvertrag).





Accommodation

Student halls of residence

International students can apply for a place in the residence halls directly at the Student Welfare Services. They offer inexpensive lodgings for about 1,700 students. The rent ranges from € 150 to € 350 per month. If you wish to apply for a room or would like to get further information about private accommodation you should contact

You can also ask the Student Welfare Service for a list of private housing offers. In this case, it is not a room in the residence halls but a room from private persons who report to the dormitory if they have spare rooms. To receive access to this list you can contact them by mail: wohnen@sw-os.de

Housing market

Due to a high demand at the beginning of the semester the places in the residence halls are taken quite quickly. New students must take into account that they might have to wait before being offered a room in one of the halls of residence. Therefore you should start your search for accommodation in good time (see below) and be ready for compromises, i.e. to accept unattractive lodgings for your first period of stay in Osnabrück.

You should start your search at an early date, at the latest after receiving your letter of admission. If necessary, you may have to consider renting a room before semester begins, just to ensure you have a room. There is always a very high demand for rooms at the beginning of the academic year. The high demand in the city often leads also to higher rents. Since students at Osnabrück University can use public transport in and around Osnabrück for free, you should also consider renting outside the city. You may also like to consider contacting Osnabrück landlords and housing associations together with other students, in order to obtain a larger flat for sharing. This can be beneficial not only from a financial point of view. Ensure that each member of the shared flat receives their own individual housing contract.

... university?

Question:

How can I join the welcome week?

Answer:

The Welcome Week of the International student Center offers the perfect opportunity for International students to get an first overview of the studies, the university and the city of Osnabrück. Usually it takes place the week before the lectures start.

Many things will be discussed and presented during that week, for instance you can do a tour to get to know the library of the university or you can get help opening a bank account.

Question:

What are the times for the different semesters?

Answer:

Academic Calendar

1st semester (winter semester) October, 1st – March, 31st 2nd semester (summer semester) April, 1st – September, 30th

Lecture period

Winter semester middle of October until middle of February (approx.) Summer semester beginning of April until beginning of July (approx.)

Arrival days

Winter semester beginning of October Summer semester beginning of April

Orientation and Welcome Week

Winter semester first week in October Summer semester first week in April

Question:

How is the German education system organized?

Answer:

There are a number of ways to give courses at German institutions of higher education, some of which we will describe below:

Seminar (Seminar)

A seminar is a lesson for a limited number of participants, in which academic problems are portrayed and elaborated in detail. The seminars are usually

subdivided into Bachelor/Master. Students are expected to actively participate in seminars. Proof of academic achievement is usually given after successful completion of a presentation or essay.

Lecture (Vorlesung)

In a lecture the subject is conveyed to the students by the lecturer in the form of a presentation. Students are usually only required to listen and make notes. The contents of the lecture must then be worked over at home by the students (or in a special tutorial). Proof of academic achievement is usually given after successful completion of a written examination (Klausur).





Exercise (Übung)

An exercise is a class with a limited number of participants, in which students learn how to practically apply the scientific methods of working in a particular field.

Tutorial (Tutorium)

A tutorial is a working group linked to a lecture, seminar or exercise, in which the contents of the class are prepared or worked over. Tutorials are usually given by a tutor (generally an advanced student).

Practical (Praktikum)

Practicals are natural science classes, in which small groups carry out experimental work. A practical can, however, also be a period of time (usually during the vacations), during which the student gains practical experience in a company or organisation.

Question:

Is there any kind of academic counseling available besides the Intercultural Mentoring?

Answer:

During your stay at Osnabrück University several counselling facilities assist you in planning and organising your studies.
